## Previous Work

Before joining Arent Fox, Laura worked in government affairs at the American Council on Education (ACE), the nation's largest higher education organization. During her time there she coordinated the higher education community response to tax proposals and revenue provisions before the House Ways and Means Committee and Senate Finance Committee.
